COURSE: Beginning Spanish II SPN 1001 A

CREDIT: 3

1. **DESCRIPTION**

This second beginning course builds on Spanish 1000. It ensures that students have a firm basis in basic Spanish by developing written and reading skills, with emphasis on listening and oral skills. Students will be taught more on Spanish culture and civilization.

1.1 Prerequisite: The course is open to students who have satisfactorily completed Spanish 1000.

- Demonstrate an acceptable knowledge of the geography and history of Spain and the Latin American countries
