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Section 2 Course Goals and Course Description

1. Course Goals

Sociology is the scientific study of social interactions and of social organizations. The course seeks to provide students with an understanding of human society and social action in the modern world. Students identify and understand the elements of cultures, social structures, social institutions and social/ global stratification which influence individuals' life orientation and alter their life chances. Students appreciate life in different social contexts whilst comprehending its limitations. Students understand theoretical perspectives and ongoing debates in sociology. Students employ critical thinking in applying the perspectives to various social contexts and social problems existing in the modern world. Students explore social injustice and inequalities, reflect and relate to their own life, and suggest solutions for a betterment of society.

Learning skills students can develop and apply for further study or work in future are as follows:

- Students create and construct an argument effectively as well as identify, critique and evaluate the logic and validity of arguments surrounding Sociology
- Students select and use methods to solve multifaceted social problems
- Students learn the strategies used by other sociologists in solving social problems in the past and adapt them to modern social problems
- Students explore and situate oneself in a new physical environment and intellectual perspectives.
- Students apply ethical frameworks and consider their implications in his/her decision-making and interacting with others
- Students use a variety of means/ technologies to communicate effectively and purposefully- e.g. in presentation, social work project and class discussion
- Students collaborate and work effectively as part of a student group/team member to arrive at the team shared-goals in time



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2. Course Description

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Section 3 Course Objectives, Course-level Learning Outcomes and Course Implementation

1. Course Objectives

The course describes important sociological perspectives, elements of cultures, social structures and socialization process which influence lives. It outlines changes in the institutions of modern society. The course explains the social factors which account for the differences and inequalities between societies and individuals. It encourages students to interrelate human interactions with social phenomena in the modern world. It provides the frameworks for students to synthesize factors which influence the sense of self and to appreciate life beyond the modern world's challenges.
